Thanks be to God for what we have gained, may God comfort us in what we grieve, may we be forgiven for the things we did (and did not do) that separated us from God or each other, and may God sustain us and nurture us for the year to come.

THE ANNUAL REPORT

When 2020 dawned last January, we already knew it would be a year of horizons. A major focus from 2019, selling our rectory and another small parcel of land by the garage, carried over into the new year. We still had work to do to complete a comprehensive survey of our property boundaries in order to update the municipal records, and we faced a long line of approvals still in process. Little did we know that COVID would completely overshadow anything related to those property sales.

It may seem that selling property and redefining our campus have nothing to do with COVID. In fact, I think the two are integrally linked. Between 1840 and the 1950's, St. John's grew its campus. (continued)

ANNUAL MEETING

The 181st meeting of St. John's Episcopal Church will occur on January 31, 2021, after our Virtual Worship service. All active, financially contributing members of the parish over the age of 18 are eligible to vote. We will not use paper ballots. Instead we will ask people to indicate their votes by raising their hand (if on Zoom), or by voice if they are on the phone. Inside is important information about the 2021 nominees, the 2021 budget and review of 2020.

The parish built the Church, the Carriage House, and the Parish House. We received parcels of land that now make up the parking lot and Episcopal Avenue, as well as the greenspaces by the church and the area where the garage stood. Since the 1950's, much of the parish's ministry and our outlook revolved around the use and maintenance of those buildings.


For years, the parish wondered what to do with the rectory (Rand House). Deeded to the parish in the 1870's, the building was known as much for housing clergy as for housing the St. John's Nursery School. How many people know St. John's because they or their children went to that nursery school? The rectory also provided rental income for a number of years. However, more than a decade ago, Vestry began looking at selling the property. Selling would not be easy; the building needed updating, and utility lines connecting the rectory to the Parish House would need separating. The property needed to be subdivided. But, perhaps more than that, we faced a restriction in the deed which said that any change in the property would automatically revert the ownership to the heirs of the woman who deeded it to us: Sarah Rand. Finding those heirs seemed a near impossible task more than 150 years after the fact. In some ways, it felt like too much of an uphill climb to sell the rectory. So we continued with maintaining it as best we could, and property. renting it as a residential Various maintenance issues arose, including lead paint remediation plumbing. A vast amount of volunteer hours went and Vestry time into maintaining Rand House.

Then, at the Annual Meeting in 2019, we brought discussion on the matter to the parish. The answer was clear: pursue selling. At about the same time, we

received an offer to buy a small parcel of land abutting a neighbor on Monroe Street. We decided to pursue both transactions, and thus 2019 became a year of research, contractors, and slow movement towards rightsizing our property. One additional building issue came into focus: the garage.

We received the garage as part of a property gift in the early part of the 20th century. Originally a house stood in front of the garage, which was torn down to make the parking lot. The garage remained, and over the years it became increasingly unstable. engineer's report in late 2019 said the garage was too unstable to occupy. It would need to come down. We began pursuing options for removal of the garage and installation of a small shed replacement. Thus dawned 2020, along with the final stages of selling and reconfiguring our property. We were tired from the process, but we could see the finish line. We could also see that the cash from the sale and the freedom from having to constantly care for the house would give us opportunities to focus elsewhere.

In late January, we held Celebration Sunday; a time to name and commemorate all that we had done in the parish, and to focus ourselves on stewardship of our future. With large sheets of butcher paper on the walls, we (continued)



noted everything from Silver Spoons luncheons to new electrical and gas lines to the Parish House. We took the time to mark and name all that made St. John's special. We thanked God, and we rolled out the areas for ministry emphasis in 2020, including a renewed focus on community outreach.

Less than 6 weeks later it all shifted, almost overnight. On March 8, we held our last in-person service during the first lockdown, due to the growing threat of the Corona virus.

To move from worship and parish life within our buildings to a life of community via telephone and online meeting took momentous effort. Many of us had never heard of platforms like Zoom before. We needed to figure out how to connect, and how to keep those connections going. The technology was one thing. It took real emotional work and dedication to learn a new approach during that time of great fear and uncertainty. We had no idea how long it would last, or how much it would require of us. We had to rethink all of what we did, what it meant to worship while not being in the building and how we do music. We had to think about what is heard, and seen, and who says it, and how to ensure it all worked. We also had to consider life without the Eucharist. which is so fundamental to our life in Christ.

Though we did not know it at the time (how could we?), the discernment and work required to get ourselves together as a virtual worshiping community changed us fundamentally. We were, in a sense, reborn. The buildings, which had been our focus for so very long, became much less important. We were told not to gather, not to be in the space. God (and we) had left the building.

St. John's was incorporated as a parish in 1840. We built our first building in 1842.

St. John's as a community was reborn, and rededicated in 2020. That may sound like hyperbole, but it's not. We are fundamentally different now. Consider the following:

- People who were separated from us due to health concerns now join us from the comfort of their homes.
- People who were apart geographically now participate from anywhere.
- We now have a different window into each other's lives, seeing one another at home.
- We also see each other's families and pets.
- We see each other's names on the screen, and we learn those names.
- New voices are reading, and singing, and playing instruments.
- New pieces of music are part of our liturgy.
- We are rethinking our prayers and our prayer life and incorporating new prayer resources.
- We are connecting through the Coffee Hour, learning more, and laughing more.

To that last point, one of the key developments in 2020 was our new Care Team, who provided greeting cards, muffins, phone calls, Christmas cards, birthday greetings and other moments throughout of support the parish. Perhaps the best thing about the Care Team is that it is entirely driven by lay people. So often in a parish our size, all activities are driven from the Rector's desk. That the Care Team started. gained momentum and has done such amazing ministry is a testament to this parish's ability to innovate, experiment and go big." What an amazing blessing! (continued)

Another key point from the above list is our music ministry. Again, entirely laydriven, our music ministry has morphed from a choir that practiced on Sundays before the service to a wide array of musicians and musical talents playing live and recorded music. None of this could occur without the amazing talent and dedication of John Richards. His leadership through a maze of recording impediments, compliance copyright issues. selection, and the hundreds of hours of recording, editing, and mixing gave us some of the most gorgeous, complex music our parish has ever known. Further, we are blessed to have musicians such as Peter Baillargeon, Allan Shafer, Jan Metcalf, Pat Culver, Ray and Eileen Locke, and Gloria Loomis playing live for us on occasion. All of these efforts helped to elevate the quality and sacredness of our communal worship and common prayer.

Speaking of common prayer, I must Holy Week Easter. mention and prepared packages for each household. We thought carefully about how to reflect and relay the solemnity of those seven days through online worship. We also gave special attention to Easter and the idea of resurrection when the virus was sweeping through us in our first big wave. And then it happened...I came down with COVID and could not lead worship. Our wardens, Allene and John, stepped up to lead, and Prince Singh provided a prerecorded sermon. The people came together. and it was an amazing celebration of new life in the risen Christ.





So too, with Christmas. How would we celebrate Christmas if we couldn't see each other, smell the greens, or sit shoulder to shoulder with our candles "Silent Night?" We focused during instead on the relationships. We gave nativity sets to the children in the parish. We wove videos of Brandon Shafer, Mary Lamphier, Josie Meza and Shelly Shellman, Lucas Smith, MacKenna Sequeira, John Roberts, and the family of Bran Knowles together to show near and far, younger and older, all beloved voices of our community. We told the story of Christ's incarnation by seeing each other and praying together. And we capped it off with a 21-track version of Night of Silence and Silent Night, using candles that we delivered to every member's home in the Rochester area. We are community. We are Christ's own.



St. John's is no longer a church exclusively anchored to buildings behind the Honeoye Falls Post Office. Neither are we defined by those who have gathered in person with us over so many years. Now that we stream our services on Facebook, people who have never set foot on our campus hear us and worship with us, and find God speaking through our message. That is truly sharing the Good News with the world! (continued)

St. John's Engaged the Community in 2020Last year we grew in our commitment to, and engagement with the community.
Among other things:

- We gave financial assistance to families struggling with rent, utilities, food and gas money.
- We provided funding and furniture to families that lost their housing when the Four Seasons Chinese restaurant burned.
- We made masks and distributed them to the parish and the local Honeoye Falls pandemic group.
- We donated food and money to the FISH Food Cupboard.
- We donated food and warm clothing to the Veteran's Outreach Center.
- We provided discounted haircuts in partnership with Lupinetti's Hair Styling.
- We provided a parade to the quarantined residents of Pinehurst, cheering them on and sharing love.
- We held an election night Spaghetti Supper, giving meals away to anyone who voted.
- We provided technical support for online worship to several parishes around the Diocese.
- We gave over 100 bars of soap to A Meal and More soup kitchen in Rochester.
- We caroled at Pinehurst and around Honeoye Falls.

2020 was not just the year of the pandemic. faced significant unrest also concern about race matters, and increasing political tensions related to the presidential campaign. The events of 2020 put stress on households, and individual communities, relationships. Members of St. John's participated in demonstrations. in education, in conversations, and in prayer. We read books to help us understand both the history of discrimination and our own role in it. We looked for ways to understand ourselves and each other. We asked God for presence among us. We prayed for peace.



In the summer, the pandemic slowed enough to allow us back into the buildings. It was not just a matter of turning the key and flipping on the lights. We gave serious consideration to being together while keeping everyone safe. Hand sanitizer, masks, contact tracing, camera placement, and the process for distributing Communion all rose up as key considerations. For about 12 weeks, we worshipped together in a hybrid fashion, with some at home and some in the church. During each of those weeks, we celebrated Holy Eucharist, and consecrated wine, but we did not consume it. We reserved that wine in the aumbry, adding a little more to the flagon reserved sacrament each Ultimately, though, we needed to go back to only online worship. I want you to remember that the wine remains in the aumbry. Some day-and I hope it is not too far off-we will return to in-person (hybrid) worship, and the Blood of Christ will be there to welcome us home.

Despite all the tumult and change, 2020 had significant moments of joy too. Four families had weddings: Emily Hurley and Robin Shook, Erin and Elliott Goodness, Kaelin Richards and Phil Allmendinger, and Sarah Shafer and Mike Wert. We baptized Hadley and Madison Schafer. We welcomed new members, and we saw some people return. Some of us got new pets. Some welcomed new grandchildren. We continued (virtual) involvement with College for Congregational Development. We tended the gardens at St. Johns and cared for the local cats. We even held our first Fall Flea and Fun, the Election Night Spaghetti Supper, and a successful plant sale. And through it all, we thanked God.




